

"We achieve a lot at this school. We especially thrive in ACE points. ACE points stand for:

"The Always Club is a club that happens at the end of two terms. You can join it if you only have one or no levels, your attendance is 97% or above and always doing the right thing. In the Always Club, you will be told where you need to go, and it will usually be a breakfast, or a treat given to you. You will sit with other Year 7s and 8s who are also in the club. If you get a certain amount or ace points, you can earn badges to show it. A bronze star shows you have 150 ACE points; a silver star is if you have 300 ACE points and gold is 500."

READING TO ACHIEVE AT GWA

An interview with Mrs Cockcroft, GWA Librarian

Why should you read books?

Research has shown that reading for pleasure is a key indicator for future success. Student who read more than their classmates score higher in all their assessments, not just English.

How does reading help students to access the curriculum?

It will expand their vocabulary, sharpen their writing skills and improve their ability to think critically.

How does GWA build literacy into the curriculum?

We use an adaptive literacy program called 'Reading Plus', and we dedicate 20 minutes to reading every day. A book is considered part of our students' essential daily equipment, and they have access to the library during the day.

What can parents do to encourage students to read?

Reading isn't just about reading novels. Parents and carers can provide good quality magazines, non-fiction books, graphic novels & manga, short stories and audiobooks. Parents and carers could introduce the expectation of reading 'a chapter a day' or setting a 10-min reading timer.
